

Stay Informed! Get Your Questions Answered!

- When it comes to high school, the more information you have the better equipped you'll be to help your student get the most out of their high school years and make the best choices for the future.
- Come to the monthly meetings. While Council's bylaws allow only 15 parent representatives, non-members are welcome to attend any meeting.
- If you wish to be a member, put your name forward in September or June.
- Hear the latest reports from the Principal, the Staff and the Student Representative.
- Get up-to-date information on School, Board and Provincial developments.
- Can't make the meetings? Check the School Council section of the school web site often.
- Know any members of the SRB School Council? Ask them for news or get on the Council's email list.

Council Mandate

The mandate of the Council includes serving as a liaison among the School, the District School Board, parents, students and the community—advising on all areas of school policy, maintaining a schoolwide focus within parameters established by the Board.

The Council focuses on initiatives aimed at maximizing educational opportunities and enhancing school life by establishing its goals, priorities and procedures, while promoting the best interests of the school community.

SRB School Council: Learn About "<u>Nothing</u>"

Secondary school can be one of the most challenging times for students. The need for independence combined with the influence of peers and the media, all add to the pressures they face with more complex subject matter and performance expectations.

And most of us are in the same boat. Our teens come home and say "nothing" happened that day, but then they spend hours text messaging, and/or online with friends chatting about the "nothing" that just happened.

While you want your teens to learn to make their own decisions, neither you nor they are ready for them to make important life choices without your input. So you need to stay informed and understand how school works.

To track all the "nothing" happening in your student's life, the SRB School Council is your information source. From the achievements of school groups, to what happened at the last dance, to changes in the Math curriculum, the Principal, Staff and Student Council reports will keep you in the loop.

Staying in Touch

Most teenagers say they don't want their parents to be involved in high school– thinking that their peers will criticize them for your presence. However, they still need and seek your guidance. So staying touch with the details of school life is vital.

Beating the One-Word Answers.

You can only coach and mentor your teen if you know what is going on and one-word answers don't exactly help you connect. Here are a few tips from the Ministry of Education:

- Be assertive not intrusive.
- Use open-ended questions.
- Ask pertinent questions about their specific courses.
- Focus on the positive. Help give them confidence to overcome barriers.
- Support them when they err by turning the mistakes into teaching moments.
